- What classes would teach you more about the work of a power company?

- Invite a woman from National Grid's Women in Non-Traditional Roles (WiNTR) organization to speak to your troop about their experiences.

- What subject areas can teach you more about the different types of work at a power company?
- Read about a woman who was a pioneer in the electricity, power or clean energy industry.

# Neighborhood Development and Community Engagement Patch



#### Daisy, Brownie, Junior:

- Who are the different people in our neighborhood that help to provide energy sources? They might include the cable people, electric people, or water people.
- Have a discussion with your family or your troop about a problem or need in your neighborhood.
- What would you do to solve or improve the problem or need in your neighborhood?
- How will you know you are successful with meeting that need or solving the problem?

#### Cadette, Senior, Ambassador:

- Identify a problem or need in your community.
- What are some potential ways of solving that problem or needs?
- Take action and choose a way you think would be most effective and try to solve or meet the need
  of that problem.
- How can you measure the success of the solution?



## **Environmental Justice and Social Equity Patch**

#### Daisy, Brownie, Junior:

- Have a discussion with your troop or family about what it means to have equal access to all the things we need, such as clean water, grocery store, safe parks, healthy home to live, etc.
- Tell a story in pictures about what it looks like to have equal access to all the things we need.
- Share your pictures with others and discuss how you can spread the word throughout the community.
- Create a video or ask a community partner (grocery store, library, school, etc.) to display your work to inform the community.

#### Cadette, Senior, Ambassador:

- What is the definition of environmental justice and social equity?
- Talk about the importance about what it means to have equal access to the things we need, such as clean water, grocery store, safe parks, healthy home to live, etc.
- Identify ways you can make positive changes or improve access to the things people need in the community and the surrounding communities.
- Create a video, website, blog or use another digital media tool as a way to communicate your message to the public.
